Six Year Capital Plan - Proposed Projects

FILO Steam Mitigation (\$20 million/year)

Receipts to this fund are a result of Sec 404 permits issued by the US Army Corps of Engineers that require compensatory mitigation for losses of wetlands or streams under federal jurisdiction. Projects to be funded using receipts to this fund will be decided by a Management Review Team (MRT) comprised of representatives from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Law Enforcement Shooting Range (\$2.6 million donations)

The FBI has approached KDFWR about funding a training shooting range. The discussions regarding this project are preliminary.

Wildlife Shooting Range (\$2 million estimate)

This range would be funded with a federal hunter education grant. The grant is 75% federal funding matched with 25% agency receipts.

There are statutes and regulations pertaining to cervid meat processors that the department is responsible for enforcing; however, the department has no means of identifying locations and contact information for all current processors because there is no license system for these businesses, unlike all other commercial businesses that make a profit from a fish or wildlife resource.

Unfortunately, Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD), an always-fatal neurologic disease in deer and elk, has now been found in 6 of 7 states surrounding Kentucky. It is imperative that the department know where all these businesses are located so they can implement their CWD prevention protocols regarding testing and enforcement of laws. In the event CWD is detected in Kentucky, it is equally important the department be able to effectively communicate with deer processors to implement a CWD response plan to help contain and manage the disease.

We recommend creating a required registration system for cervid meat processors, as defined in KRS 150.722, in order to have accurate contact and location information of these businesses. There is no fee associated with this registration.

This required registration will allow the department to both effectively communicate CWD response measures with processors, as well as better enforce current laws associated with these establishments.

Action:

Add a subsection to 301 KAR 2:185, Section 4 that

will allow a student to receive their Hunter Education Certification without having to complete an "in-person" course or live fire

exercise.

Remove the "license exempt" portion of Section 2. This would make it a requirement that all hunters in Kentucky, born after January 1st 2002, pass a hunter education course before hunting.

Allowing the Hunter Education Certification to be achieved via a free online learning course provides constituents with an alternative opportunity to complete the Hunter Education requirement while still maintaining safety standards. The addition of an online only option allows KDFWR to reach constituents that may have limited time and resources to travel to a range day or in-person course. Given the busy schedules of many potential Hunter Education students, the online only option enables them to complete the course in a manner that works with their schedule. In-person courses will still be available for those students that prefer to learn in a classroom setting. By eliminating barriers to complete the Hunter Education requirement, KDFWR is working to ensure that all hunters in the field have completed the Hunter Education requirement.

With the implementation of an online option, many of the barriers to complete an in-person course have been removed including travel costs, course availability, competition for students' time and others. With these barriers removed, KDFWR should strive to have all hunters in the field trained in Hunter Education. Therefore, we propose removing the exemption for the hunter education requirement for landowners and/or their dependents born after January 1, 2002.

NASP Tournament

On March 15th and 16th, Kentucky set a new record for the largest State NASP Tournament in the Country. With 7,040 archers, Kentucky broke the previous record of 6,504. That record was set by Kentucky in 2018. Kentucky's State NASP International Bow Hunters/3D Challenge also set a record with 1,541 archers. Additionally, the inaugural "NASP Alumni Shoot" was held during the State Tournament. There were 248 archers that competed in this just-for-fun competition. Amongst those archers were seventeen teams that competed for the grand prize of a NASP start-up kit for starting a NASP program in a new school. The winning team, the "West Kentucky Bush Wookies", received the start-up kit valued at \$3,200 to give to a school of their choice in need of a NASP program.

Information Item: New Regulatory Requirements due to HB 4

Recent changes to a bill relating to administrative regulations will extend the legislative approval timeline for any proposed changes to our administrative regulations.

The following changes related to House Bill 4 take effect June 27, 2019.

- The public comment period will be extended for an additional month. Currently, the public comment period is 45 days.
- The legislative subcommittee to which the regulation is assigned shall have an additional 60 days to hold a public meeting during which the regulation shall be reviewed. If the subcommittee meets, the regulation is effective upon adjournment. If the subcommittee does not meet, the regulation is effective 90 days after referral. Currently, the regulation becomes effective 30 days after referral.
- An emergency regulation will expire 270 days after the date of filing, if the ordinary regulation does not become effective first. Currently, an emergency regulation remains in effect for 180 days.

Considering these changes to House Bill 4, if an administrative regulation takes the maximum amount of time to become effective, it will take an additional three months for amendments to a regulation to go into effect. Therefore, if comments are received and the interim joint committee does not meet, it would take 8 months for a regulation to become effective.

The Commission is encouraged to consider this extended timeline when voting to recommend changes to administrative regulations. Allowing enough lead-time will ensure that any changes to administrative regulations are reflected in regulatory guides. The guides summarize for the public the laws related to fishing, boating, hunting and trapping.

Cutthroat Trout Regulation

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Hatchery program recently informed Kentucky that it had a surplus of cutthroat trout and asked if we were interested in stocking 38,000 in the Cumberland tailwater, free of charge, this year. Cutthroat trout are highly prized by serious trout anglers and would make an excellent addition to fishing in the tailwater. Since the USFWS Wolf Creek hatchery will only produce similar numbers annually in the future, and they are so highly revered, we are proposing a daily creel limit of 1 cutthroat trout that must be at least 20 inches in length. Regarding the trophy fish program, any cutthroat trout less than 20 inches will not be recognized.

In 2009, after two years of discussions with the public concerning excessive construction of buildings, access structures and boat docks on departmentowned lakes, the Department created 301 KAR 1:016 and it was passed into law in April 2010. The regulation contains restrictions to the size and construction of boat docks and access structures and other buildings. A pamphlet was created to make the regulations easier for the public to understand (A Guide for Construction On Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources Lakes and Land Buffer Areas), and a reminder card is sent out to adjacent landowners each January that the regulation exists and a pamphlet is available for viewing on our website; and we will mail hard copies to those without internet access.

Lake Beshear was not included in the list of department-owned lakes because the Department has a contract agreement with the City of Dawson Springs to enforce the state regulations and control construction on our buffer around the lake. In recent years, it has become apparent that the City cannot legally enforce the laws as was agreed upon in the 1962 contract. Therefore, we are in the process of trying to reconstruct a contract with the City that will not contain requirements that it cannot legally fulfill. In order to provide the same guidelines to Lake Beshear as are required of all other department-owned lakes, the Fisheries Division is recommending that the lake is included in .01 KAR 1:016. The addition to the regulation will require a public meeting in Dawson Springs that will be held prior to the June Commission meeting if the Committee votes to move this proposal forward.

The League of Kentucky Sportsmen has brought forth a resolution requesting that the department research a perceived decline in bullfrog populations across the state. Concerned hunters have inquired as to actions that may enhance bullfrog populations, particularly in the western portion of the state. While there are no data that a steep decline is ongoing, shortening the harvest season in Kentucky could have a beneficial impact on bullfrog populations. This would protect the best breeders through the major part of the spawning season and ensure that many of the biggest females would remain in the ponds, river backwaters, and wetlands long enough into the summer to produce at least one large egg mass each. Among Kentucky and our seven border states, only two states (Kentucky, Tennessee) allow bullfrog harvesting in May, and only three states (Kentucky, Tennessee, Virginia) allow frogs to be harvested through the entire month of June.

Action:

Remove 3 shell limit on shotguns for snow goose conservation order season

The Snow Goose Conservation Order Season was a special season created by the US Fish and Wildlife Service to reduce populations of continently overabundant snow geese. Rapidly growing populations of snow geese threatened to damage fragile arctic habitats where they nest. The conservation order season, which occurs outside of normal hunting seasons, was designed to remove restrictions to harvest that limit take of these birds. The Conservation Order Season incorporates tools such as electronic calls, no bag limits, extended shooting hours and removal of requirements to use plugged guns to increase harvest. Kentucky disallowed the use of more than 3 shells while hunting with a shotgun by statute, so Kentucky was not able to take advantage of this and had to be more restrictive than federal law allows. Recent changes to the statute allows for unplugged guns while hunting snow geese during the Conservation Order Season. We recommend adding an exemption in regulation to plugged gun requirements that would allow for unplugged guns during the conservation order season.

Action Items: Modification of 301 KAR 2:251, Hunting

and trapping seasons and limits for furbearers

Action:

Current regulation allows a person to take coyotes after daylight hours; however, the use of artificial light or other means designed to make wildlife visible at night only is permitted from February 1 through May 31. Coyote hunting at night is currently only permitted using a shotgun; however, a single projectile shell is not allowed. The Commission has received requests to expand the opportunity for more nighttime hunting with lights to allow a broader timeframe and/or allow the use of rifles for hunting coyotes at night. Biologically this is not an issue; however, there are several potential social, safety, and enforcement issues with this proposal.

Action:

The United Trappers of Kentucky have requested to extend the trapping season on defined water sets through the end of March. This past year we extended the trap check timeframe and the season for nuisance beaver trapping efforts only. We have outstanding research on river otter that needs to be considered, non-target species take, and timing of trapping with species already having young of the year. Meetings with trapper and houndsmen organizations may be needed as well.

Modification of 301 KAR 2:049, Small game and furbearer hunting and trapping on public areas and 301 KAR 2:122, Seasons, method, and limits for small game

Action:

The department has had a request from grouse hunters to end the grouse hunting season on public lands on December 31st each year. The low grouse numbers and higher rate of use and pressure on public lands could limit the reproduction or cause declines in grouse populations on the heavily used public areas.

Grouse hunters also have requested to close the statewide grouse hunting season on January 31st each year. The low grouse numbers and the take of grouse into the winter months could cause additive mortally, limit the reproduction, or cause declines in grouse populations. The division recommends we survey current Kentucky grouse hunters, discuss the proposal with the grouse hunting groups, and other interested clubs and constituents to gain more information on the proposal.
