

November 27, 2019 Kentucky Waterfowl Ground Counts

Opening day is almost here, and weather predictions look normal for late November, but as always in KY... ever changing. Winds will start out from the North on Thursday, but move each day during the opening segment of the season. Friday should see an East wind, Saturday from the South, and then from the West on Sunday.

This year has been a year of extremes. Flooding that began last duck season persisted into mid-July along the big rivers, especially on areas along the lower Ohio and Mississippi Rivers. When the rain finally stopped... it stopped for two months (+/- check local listings). Rains picked back up this fall, just in time for an early arctic blast to hit in early November.

Habitat across the state varies from excellent to poor, with most areas on the high side of the scale. Many areas along the big rivers or at Duck Island do not have grain crops for waterfowl food plots this year. The flooding persisted so long that crops either could not be planted or did not do well by being planted so late. Again, this varies. Most areas were able to plant some crops, and several stands did well... but there are many spots that the crops either were not planted were out competed by native moist soil vegetation. The extreme weather did however invigorate the moist soil vegetation that grows naturally in these wet areas. Moist soil plants, which are the backbone of waterfowl management, thrived this year! Wild Millets, Panic grass, Sprangletop, sedges, smartweeds and toothcup thrived, leaving impressive amounts of food available this winter. Moist soil plants provide more protein and amino acids than any crop can produce. The bugs and invertebrates that inhabit these plants are also extremely important forage. Wetland conditions and food availability are set for a productive waterfowl season.

Duck season will begin on Thanksgiving Day, with the first segment running from November 28 – December 1. The second segment of duck season opens on December 7th, and NEW THIS YEAR, will run until January 31, 2020. Goose season will open November 28, 2019 and will remain open until February 15, 2020. The western zone youth hunt will be February 1-2, 2020. Also new this year is the daily bag limit reduction from 2 birds to 1 for Northern Pintail. All other bag limits remain the same.

Very late flood followed by a drought resulted in poor response even by normally reliable natural vegetation. ~40 acres of Japanese millet was seeded, but germination and growth was poor.</p> <p>We have plenty of water stockpiled for our planned gradual increase in shallow flooded acres. Water levels at the moment within the island can be considered normal.</p>
Doug Travis WMA <i>11/21/2019</i>	4,550 Ducks	95% Mallard, 5% mixed dabblers	<p>It was difficult to accurately count ducks in Beaver Pond and in parts of Indian Camp due to the amount of flooded natural vegetation where the ducks are concentrating. All blind site units are flooded and ready to hunt. Baldy's Woods, Ward Tract, and Milner WRP walk-in units are flooded. We have started letting water into the Fish Lake Greentree impoundment. Indian Camp Rest Area impoundments are 60% flooded & we are holding the rest to prevent early seed decomposition.</p>
